NEW YEAR RESOLUTIONS


- 1. I will remember to put in 20c when I have a second cuppa.

If anyone can this of more pleaseadd them at the bottmm and initial them.






A CHRISTMAS WISH.

Many memories we have of Christmas past, As the years now go too fast May there be many more for you To celebrate and be happy too.
















The next "Introduction" course will begin in the Committee Room on

Monday 12 February 1996 at 1.30 pm.

By then the school holidays should be over, and participants should be in a position to make a firm commitment to attendance.

As before, the theme of the introductory course, which takes about 12

As before, the theme of the introductory course, which takes about 12 weeks, will be how to enter the world of home computing at minimal expense and at the same time learn how to carry out some useful home tasks such as word processing and home accounting. No previous knowledge is necessary (although some familiarity with a typewriter keyboard is advantageous), and it is not necessary to own a computer, since all exercises are carried out on the Club's machine.

The usual activity fee will appply, and it may be necessary to charge a once-only fee of \$2 to cover photocopying costs. The absolute maximum number of participants is 10, but if more than this number apply consideration will be given to running an additional course. A list calling for names will appear on the Notice Board after Christmas.

In addition to the "Introduction" course, it has been suggested that a CONTINUATION COURSE be held to cater for those who have completed one of the previous "Introduction" courses or are of equivalent standard. The syllabus for this would be negotiable but would probably include more advanced features of DOS (eg. the config.sys file and the creation & use of batch files) and further development of the programmes already studied (eg. embedded commands in MultiMate and writing a simple programme in dBase language). If there is sufficient interest I am prepared to start such a class in the New Year, but will need to know NOW in order to prepare the material.
