COMPUTER GROUP

The "Introduction to the Personal Computer" course, which began in April, finally came to an end on 13 July. The determined few (Ann, Ingrid, Marie and Tom) who had persevered to the bitter end, and survived the dreaded weekly exercises, were awarded certificates proclaiming their competence to drive a computer without

danger to the public. Rather belatedly, certificates were also presented to two survivors of the previous Advanced course (Bill and Sheila). Congratulations to all. The afternoon finished on a sibilant note - Soup, Sandwiches and Spumante.

Will the "Introduction" course be run again? Probably not - at least in its present form. The aim of the course as originally devised was to convince people who had never touched a computer that much useful work (and fun) could be obtained from an old XT or 286 machine which could be picked up for a few dollars, and DOS-based programmes free for the asking. Nowadays most people who express an interest in the course already own, or have access to, more modern machines running graphical operating systems and are looking for programme-specific "how to " courses rather than the "why is it so" basics. Even if I was competent to run such a course, the increased complexity of these huge programmes would imply a very lengthy course, and it is difficult enough to find people able to make an uninterrupted commitment for even the twelve weeks required by the "Introduction" course.

So for the time being, Monday afternoons will revert to being a time when anyone interested in computers, whether they already own one or not, can come along and discuss conceptual or practical problems, demonstrate new hardware or software, use the Club's computer and generally prove that "geeks" can be Senior Citizens too. The first of such free-wheeling sessions occurred on 20 July, when the group was able to demonstrate to a new member that his computer, which he said "just sat there and refused to do anything", did in fact have not only Windows for Workgroups installed but also Microsoft Works and so could be used for word processing, playing games, generating spreadsheets and other goodies. Yet another satisfied customer! Afterwards, those who were interested in musical aspects of the computer stayed on and were instructed by my son Peter in the mysteries of the MIDI interface and a beaut programme called, intriguingly, Band in a Box.
