
#### COST OF PHONE CALLS

Following a discussion re the charge of 40 cents per call when using the office telephone, I checked the phone bills back to 1st. July 1999. The office telephone money box averages \$4 per week (ten calls at 40cents each).

Comparing the total cost of ordinary calls plus mobile calls with the service and equipment charge gives a ratio of 2:1, so the cost to the Club per call is 37.5 cents. So this amount is lost to the Club each time a member forgets to put 40 cents in the money box. The number of taxi calls is so small that we cannot expect a free line as applies to licensed clubs.

Pat Cummings, the community worker has a completely separate line and account. This account is paid by the Public Officer using HACC funds.

# FROM THE COMPUTER INTEREST GROUP:

I have been asked to re-commence lessons on the use of computers. I have been reluctant to do so, partly due to lack of suitable equipment but mainly because the technology has advanced, and the programmes have become so complex, to a point where I no longer feel qualified, and as they say "a little knowledge is a dangerous thing". However, it is better than no knowledge at all, so classes will be commencing shortly.

They will differ considerably from the previous courses. For one thing, each "class" will be limited to three students so as to ensure that each person has access to a machine. The group is presently working on three borrowed computers for this purpose. Practical exercises will be done in class time, not as "homework", and on a one-to-one basis as far as possible. Note that the course will NOT cover the use of the Internet - that is a separate issue. Initially, priority in enrolment will be given to the Officers of the Club, the Committee and other members who require to use a computer for Club business. If the courses are a success it may eventually be possible to extend them to non-members on a fee basis.

It is proposed to hold a meeting of interested persons early in February to discuss the format of the course, so if you would like to be involved, watch the notice board.
