THE PRESIDENT REPORTS:

The Committee met on 16 November. The following details relate to key components of the meeting:

1. Elizabeth Halfnights resigned as Vice President but agreed to stay on the Committee; Shirley Kelly was appointed as Vice President. We are very pleased that Elizabeth will continue as a committee member and I know that Shirley will make a great contribution.

2. A sub-committee was established to review and make recommendations on safety and security measures for the Club building and environment. It will report by the end of December.

3. The Bureau of Sport & Recreation has been approached to provide three new table tennis tables. We expect a response soon. We are also seeking some government assistance in the provision of more user-friendly taps in the bathrooms. Incidentally, I discussed the upgrade of the car park with the Chief Minister when he was here on Fete day. I am quite optimistic of government support.

4. The grounds have been professionally surveyed and Umar Bourke our Office Administrator has taken on the project as a Club member. He expects to have Stage 1 of the grounds development plan ready to submit to a professional draughtsman in the very near future. There has been a change of emphasis and our plans now include an increase in car parking space over what is now available.

5. The hairdresser's contract has been cancelled, but the Committee has decided to readdress the issue. Shirley Kelly is convening a sub-committee which will examine all factors relating to the reestablishment of a hair dressing service at the Club. You will have noted the details on the Club notice boards.

The following is going around the Internet. No comment. NOTICE OF REVOCATION OF INDEPENDENCE
