PALM's April newsletter states "What many people want from planning in Woden is to foster an innovative and collaborative living and working environment while protecting and valuing the heritage and established identity of Woden Town Centre". PALM then asks "Do you agree with this?"

The Club's Admin. Team has been discussing the Club's future in a similar context for some time now, and it seems to us that we need to be considering seriously how we should fit into the community structure of Woden in the immediate and longer term. An immediate problem is to identify clearly our special niche in the region and develop our own "master plan" identifying priorities, the resources available and reqired and the costs (both social and financial) of any change. In this context, we continue to be involved with COTA (the Council of the Ageing) on plans and priorities for clubs such as our own. Plans are under way for a Clubs' Website, and COTA is investigating insurance issues for us all. You might like to attend the next seminar, on Thursday May 28th.from 1.00 pm. to 3.00 pm. which is about the management of clubs. Please let us know if you would like to be there.

Thanks to all of you who have been so supportive and active in relation to the special events in the last month - the concert, the birthday lunch, the card day and the sale of raffle tickets. And as always the Committee is appreciative of the group leaders and all the other volunteers in their various capacities. Your continuing enthusiasm and commitment is crucial to our well being as a Club.
